Dates for your Diary

Dear Frewen Parents

You will all be aware of the lessons your child studies as part of their timetable, and you probably know their various teachers, from talking to them at parents' consultation meetings, and from the reports you receive each term. But there is another important aspect to the school with which you may not be so aware, and for which, in our last Ofsted inspection, we were judged to be outstanding – and this is SMSC, which stands for **spiritual**, **moral**, **social and cultural** development. All schools in England must show how well their pupils develop in SMSC.

Some of this takes place within lessons – you can imagine that subjects like RE and History, in particular, lend themselves to this, but it can, and does, happen

in every subject, and in everything we do as a school, as part of the school's ethos. PSHE – personal, social, health and economic education - is a subject which is closely linked to SMSC, and which is designed to give pupils the knowledge, skills, and attributes they need to keep themselves healthy and safe and to prepare them for life and work in modern Britain. Some of these themes are reinforced by work with tutors, during tutor time, throughout the week.

Three times a week, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, students attend assemblies, and at Frewen these alternate between members of the Leadership Team, individual staff, and tutor groups (who often come up with the most unusual and interesting ideas!). To give you some idea of the range of themes, just this term we have had assemblies on famous dyslexics (Ingvar Kamprad, the founder of IKEA), Stephen Hawking, the film industry, African martial arts movies, International Women's Day, Science Week, Holocaust Memorial Day, safe use of Social Media, Banter vs Bullying, Starfish Malawi, Growth Mindset, short-term vs long-term memory – the list could go on and on.

Some parents, and ex-students, have come in and given careers presentations, based on their own experiences, which have gone down very well with students, and we welcome any offers for more of these.

We often tend to focus on academic progress and results, but it could be argued that the SMSC within the school is, in some ways, what holds everything together and makes the school what it is. It certainly helps the students to develop into the citizens of tomorrow, and this is why Ofsted place so much importance on it.

In the last newsletter I wrote about Frewen on Film – the seven videos which were about to be released. One of these is a video version of our prospectus, to inform the world at large about what makes Frewen unique in general; the others were the British Dyslexia Association series of short films about dyslexia strategies, of which five-and-a-half exclusively focus on Frewen.

For technical reasons it took a bit longer to get these onto our website, but they are now available for all to see, and have been very well-received. If you haven't seen them yet, simply go to www.frewencollege.co.uk, and you can't miss them!

PREP NEWS by Sally Welch

Prep School pupils have been working hard on their numeracy this half term, putting their 'using and applying skills' to the test. The practical application of mathematical concepts is often the best way to bring about a true understanding of what they are learning. This week some of our pupils marched down to the car park in order to answer the question, 'What is the most popular colour car for teachers at Frewen?' Clipboards in hands, pupils made a careful tally to show the colour of each car. Back in the classroom they were able to analyse their data and use it to answer the original question. They then used their data to ask a variety of questions which required a range of mathematical skills. Pupils asked each other questions such as which the most popular colour was and how many cars there were altogether in the car park. Just one example of bringing maths to life at Frewen Prep.

Recent changes to government recommendations on careers guidance have suggested that we should start preparing pupils for the world of work from the primary school age. With this in mind we have recently taken the pupils to the Rare Breeds Centre on a school trip. Pupils were asked to investigate different kinds of jobs people were doing. Whether it was working in a cafe, looking after the animals, maintaining farm machinery or taking money in the gift shop, our pupils were able to identify a huge variety of jobs. Pupils also had a special session learning how to look after animals, they enjoyed handling a variety of animals and learning about the special care needed to keep them healthy and happy.

As the weather improves at Frewen Prep, we are looking forward to more of our curriculum being delivered outside in our fabulous grounds. Heading off into the park is always a great way of helping our pupils learn in a really meaningful manner. We are looking forward to our camp in the summer term and thinking of sunny days where we can make full use of the school pool once again. What with the recent snow, it has seemed a very long way off! Roll on summer.

Public Speaking

Frewen Students have, for the third year running, achieved fantastic success in the LAMDA Public Speaking exams. All students in Years 7-9, and a small number of older students, took these LAMDA exams.

As with the last two years, every student passed. No students in Years 7-9 were absent on the day. 84% of

those achieved a merit or above, and 26% gained the highest distinction grade.

This year's Year 9 students are the first group to complete three years of examinations. It is particularly pleasing to see students who achieved pass grades in previous years, now achieving merit and distinction. This reveals how their confidence is developing.

Once again, these results show that Frewen students are capable of achieving comparable results to students in mainstream



independent schools. Well done to all our students on their hard work.

Touch Type Read and Spell

This term saw the launch of the Touch Type Read and Spell initiative.

This is an online program and students have been working through the modules at home and in school.

An initial 20 students have been selected to follow the program, with a view to rolling out the course more widely in future.

In addition to teaching touch typing, the program teaches spelling

through 'muscle memory'. It has been proven to improve the reading and spelling of dyslexics, and also enables many users to 'get the words down'.

Year 11s are busy working on their exam theme, which this year is 'fragments'. Students have been developing various ideas around this theme, with starting points including split personalities, limestone stacks and distorted reality. Furthermore, students are using a wide range of materials to realise their intentions including styrofoam, clay, corrugated cardboard and powerpoint, proving that in Art we don't just use pencil! Students have until the 11th May to generate their ideas, research artists, experiment with materials then their 2 day exam will begin!

A reminder to Year 11 GCSE Art Parents: there will be two ART GCSE prep/catch-up days on Thursday 5th April and Tuesday 10th April from 10am- 4pm. Theses days are really useful in terms of using the resources and dedicating a serious amount of time to their exam over the Easter holidays. If students attend both days, that is an extra 12 hours of exam preparation which will greatly improve their chances of achieving a Level 4 and above. (Please note students will need to bring their own lunches as there cannot be any unauthorised visits to the shops in the village during the day.)



One of NASA's "human computers", who helped plan the mission that saw an American astronaut orbit the Earth for the first time, has just officially opened a new research centre named in her honour.

The key contribution of **Katherine Johnson**, 99, and other African-American women to the US space programme was told in the film 'Hidden Figures', which gave overdue recognition to their brilliant work.

The maths involved in the mission was highly complex, and the computers of the day were prone to technical hiccups.

So as astronaut John Glenn was going through the preflight checklist – upon which his life depended – he insisted that Ms Johnson double check the calculations on his behalf, because

"If she says they're good, then I'm ready to go."

But, as Ms Johnson was helping the US triumph in the Race for Space, racist laws were still widely enforced. The Civil Rights Act ending segregation did not come into force until 1964.

She also had to overcome the sexist stereotype that women are inferior mathematicians to men.
