Welcome to our Newsletter

Dear Frewen Parents

We have recently revised our rewards and sanctions procedures, and I would like to take this opportunity to bring you up to date with this.

Good Order Marks (GOMs)

Starting on a positive note - very often at Frewen a student will produce an excellent piece of work, or put in particular effort, or perform a good deed of some kind. These are rewarded with Good Order Marks.

In order to encourage more consistent use of the system by students and staff we have changed the system slightly. If a student is awarded a GOM they should make sure that it is entered in the yellow pages of their homework diary and the member of staff concerned will give them a raffle ticket. If they put this raffle ticket into the box in the auditorium, they will stand a chance of winning £10, when the winning ticket is drawn at the end of each half term. The more GOMs, the more chances of winning!

The new system has so far worked well. The number of GOMs has risen; students are carrying their homework diaries; and, as a result, the quality of entries in the diaries has improved.

I should mention that students can receive a GOM for having their books signed at home - so you can help further (as well as increasing your child's chances of winning £10) by doing this!

Bad Order Marks (BOMs)

Generally, behaviour at Frewen College is very good. Students are in small classes, the lessons are interesting, the teachers supportive, and the students keen to learn - so there are few reasons to start misbehaving.

However, we have a school full of young people

between the ages of 7 and 19, and of course there is the occasional incident which needs to be addressed.

Bad Order Marks (BOMs) are the opposite of GOMs and are entered in the homework diary on the blue page. If a student acquires three BOMs in a half term they will earn a 10-minute detention with their tutor, and a further three will lead to a 20-minute detention with a Senior Leader. No student has reached this level this half term, at the time of writing. If however, they were to do this and get yet another three GOMs, this would lead to them going on report.

The names of all students who get through an entire half term with no BOMs will also be entered into a prize draw (not the same one as the GOMs) and can also win the princely sum of £10.

SENIOR SCHOOL NEWS

GCSE preparation

In English, our focus this term has, as expected, centred around the examinations season. Last year, we enjoyed our best ever English results and, this year, we are all set to break new records.

A total of 22 students will sit the GCSE English Language examinations in June. Of these, nine are Year 11s. This represents 75% of the cohort. It compares with 66% in 2017 and 33% in 2016.

Being a small school we are able to meet individual needs and because students progress at different rates we offer alternative exam pathways to suit. GCSE English is not always the right option for all of our Year 11 students. Two Year 11s (joined by two Year 10s) are taking Level 1 Functional Skills. This will give them the confidence and experience to tackle GCSE English a bit later on. Finally, three Year 10s are sitting Entry Level English.

Last year we introduced English Literature as an option, and this year the number of Year 11 students sitting this rose to 50%, from 29% in 2017.

In our Sixth Form, 13 students are taking GCSE English Language. This is consistent with our aim that all students should leave the Sixth Form with a GCSE in English.

The English team would like to thank all parents for supporting their children at this busy time.

Year Nine English

Year Nines are reflecting on the world that we live in and their role within it. Entitled 'People and Places', their current unit draws together the skills they have embedded in Key Stage Three, and moves them towards the challenges of GCSE-style questions.

Students have learned about a wide range of people and their experiences: autobiographical writing by mountaineer Robert McFarlane; seventeenth-century scientist, Jan Swammerdam, whose studies worked out how people breathe;

and Ellen MacArthur, who described sailing alone.

Students are then using this reading to think about their own experiences. They have produced extended writing on: an eventful and memorable journey; a favourite hobby; an achievement; the area where they live; and their favourite place.

Science by Scott Wassell

With spring now in full bloom the pupils have been able to experience some outdoor Ecology. Science has teamed up with the PE department and Frewen's own Hawkeye Mr Classen during Year 7 and Year 8 camps. Science provided several sampling techniques to gather information on local insects and distribution of flowers.

We can't forget to mention the Year 6 prep students who have been making 'grasheads' as part of their investigation into the best conditions for growing plants.

The Year 11s are now into their exam season. The current cohort are the first to experience the new Combined Science GCSE. The

department will be endeavouring to make sure that the students going into the exam are as prepared as possible. We wish all the students the best of luck.







BOARDING NEWS


