## Move It



## **Other Voices**

Year nine students have completed their Key Stage Three English course with a twentieth century poetry unit.

Other Voices draws together a range of modern poets, including those based in other countries and cultures. The selection is based on former GCSE English Literature poetry texts. It tackles themes of race, identity, love and justice.

Students looked at poetic 'voice' and revised their understanding of figurative language and versification. This will prepare them for the Anthology and Unseen Poetry components of GCSE English Literature.

Student, Daniel Fedden, said, "These poems explored challenging themes, with the poets selecting words and phrases for precise impact. At times, I felt as though I had been taken to a dark place, with no bus ticket home, but overall, it gave me a sense of the poem as a vehicle for social and political change and encouraged me to approach texts with greater maturity."

#### **Film Frewen**


Lead cameraman, Daniel Fedden, mused, "I was constantly looking to establish the mise-en-scene, providing a range of shots that would enable the audience to suspend their disbelief and embrace the film's message." Sixth Former. Josh Walker, exclaimed, "My character is torn between respect for the rule of law, and vengeance for my son's death at the hands of organised crime. I enjoyed representing this paradox within the human condition."



Charlie Gentle, also in the Sixth Form, stated, "I don't believe that I should be typecast by my surname. I relished the rare opportunity to convey a sense of total amorality. Wishing to perfect a naturalistic characterisation, I utilised Stanislavski's techniques, such as emotion memory, given circumstances and the magic 'if'."

## Science by Scott Wassell

Here is the final update for the year from the Science department.

It has been a very busy year with lots of hard work by the pupils and a special mention to our Teaching Assistants Mikala Davey and Jemma Holt who do exceptional work, and further praise for our Technician/TA Olinda Boulding and her myriad of jobs.

This term was about trying to stay focused on finishing the curriculum and end of year testing. This year the Science department implemented assistive technology with our testing, using the programmes speak and dictate. I must also make a special mention to Miss Cardinale and her hard work on trialling Science lessons and homework using the cloud, the future is coming.

Earlier in the term the Year 7 & 8s also had a chance to undertake some Biology field work during their annual camp. Both year groups got hands on experience of sampling invertebrates in a temperate deciduous forest using pitfall traps and pooters (see pics). These were met with mixed success, we managed to collect several species of insects but one Year 7 group received a special present left by a fox (picture not included). We also carried out a survey of the local bluebells which had just bloomed, by using belt transects and looked at the abiotic factors involved in their distribution.



# Summer Maths Loss

Imagine a lazy beach day with fractions or in the back seat on a road trip and practising long division. For many of us, summer and mathematics just don't seem to mix. But on average, students lose about 2.6 months of maths learning over the summer — and teachers must spend class time to make up for that loss.

# Four Ways to Beat the Summer Maths Slump

Highlight the maths in everyday activities. When shopping, calculate change or discounts. When cooking, try halving or doubling a recipe and work out new proportions.

Discuss maths. Studies have shown that reading mathsfocused news stories can help boost maths results. For example: the World Cup - when watching a game, talk about what team's statistics mean.

Play maths games. Games like Yahtzee, Monopoly, and cards all rely on counting, categorising, and building. Even playing with blocks and assembling jigsaw puzzles can help with spatial skills and patterns.

Find small ways to practise maths at home; for example: > small amounts of calculations & basic formulas > problem-of-the-day maths calendars
