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## Welcome to our Autumn Newsletter

### Dear Frewen Parents

It's already the end of the first half term, and I would like to thank you and your children for getting the year off to such a smooth start.

This term we welcomed twenty new students to the school. All of them

have settled in and are doing well.

We also welcomed a number of new staff: on the teaching side, we are pleased to be joined by Miss Chambers (Music and Humanities), Miss Jackson (Drama and Film Studies), and Mrs Tipping (Humanities); plus two new Sixth Form Teaching Assistants, Felicity Barnet and Rachael Taylor-Wade.

For the fourth year running, the Year 11 exam results were the best ever, both in terms of results and value-added, and the average Frewen student is now achieving just under one GCSE grade above their CAT projection at the end of Year 11, in spite of their dyslexia. Congratulations to everyone concerned! (If you are wondering, CAT projections are generated based on a national online test taken in Year 7 or when a student joins the school after this, which predicts the probability of a student gaining various grades at the end of Year 11, everything being equal).

Once again, 100% of our Sixth Formers successfully gained their qualifications and went on to further study, apprenticeships or employment.

As you may be aware, we have been discussing with the student council how personal devices might be used to help them with their learning in Year 10 and 11, in much the same way as they are

already being used by sixth formers. There are many ways in which phones, for example, can be used to support students' learning, through the use of the camera, calculator, thesaurus, dictionary, voice messaging, notes, subject-specific apps, and so on, and of course these have to be weighed against the potential risks caused by potential misuse of social media, for example. It could be argued that, for dyslexic students, the potential benefits far outweigh the risks, and we are exploring the idea of a pilot scheme whereby devices can be used in KS4 in a managed way, at certain times, in certain areas, and with parental permission. Further details will be sent to parents of Year 10 and 11 students soon.

I should mention that we are having a drive on dressing appropriately - ties done up, shirts tucked in, correct uniform - including jacket - and so on. All staff have agreed to remind students whenever necessary, and it would be helpful if parents of day students in particular could remind them of the need to look presentable. I am sure you send them off to school looking smart - but some of them are better at maintaining this than others.

On Wednesday 3rd October I received the call from Ofsted, informing me that they were about to arrive at the school to carry out a three-day boarding inspection. As we are classed as a Residential Special School, this is something we go through every year. I would like to thank those parents who provided feedback to the inspector, and also Mrs Medcraft and her team, who rose to the occasion - and not forgetting the students who, as always, gave such a good account of themselves. We are awaiting the final report, and will publish it as soon as we receive it.



This term, Year 9 students have been studying the literary text, *Stone Cold*, by Robert Swindells.




A Carnegie Medal winning novel, *Stone Cold* tracks the experiences of central character, 'Link'. Born and raised in Bradford, Link endures emotional abuse from his stepfather, Vince. To escape, he moves to London, and a series of events sees his life spiral out of control. Eventually, he is homeless. *Stone Cold* tracks Link's winter on the London streets.

The second major character is 'Shelter'. Failing to cope with his discharge from the Army and finding it difficult to find a role within civilian life, Shelter decides it is his 'mission' to clean up the streets by removing the homeless people. The novel charts Shelter's descent into madness as he becomes a serial killer. The novel hints that Shelter's volatile mental health may be a direct result of his experiences in active service.

Structured using a split or fractured narrative, both

Link and Shelter take turns to tell the story. This enables the readers of *Stone Cold* to see the same events through contrasting eyes.

In studying *Stone Cold*, students have explored the issues of homelessness, societal attitudes to poverty, depictions of London, loneliness and friendship, dysfunctional family settings and a variety of mental health issues, such as post-traumatic stress disorder. They have also looked at narrative voice, completing a series of creative and reflective tasks arising from the text.


### Science by Scott Wassell
