This week an outstanding 50% of our students took their LAMDA 'Speaking in Public' exams. This is impressive, but particularly impressive for a school for dyslexic children.



'Rarest of palindromes'


For all you numerologists, statisticians and anyone else beguiled by "oddball numbers", you will want to celebrate this date.
