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**Dear Parents** 

#### Here we are at the end of another half term!

This has been the half term when covid-19 has finally arrived at Frewen. In late January we had around a third of students off school, as well as a number of staff - not all due to covid, but in addition to the usual winter ailments. Attendance has have since improved, but we are still not back to "normal, and are hoping that the half-term break will provide a chance for everyone to recover and come back stronger than ever, ready for the longer days and warmer months that are to come.

I would like to thank all parents for your sensible approach to this, and for helping to keep not only your own child, but the school community, safe.

I know that some students were worried about their child's absence affecting their attendance figures, and that Local Authorities, for example, would be alarmed. I would like to reassure parents that, if a child is absent through illness, and the school is informed, this is not a problem. We do have to submit attendance data to the LA, and they do scrutinise it, but it is unexplained or unauthorised absence that would concern them, and this is rare at Frewen.

On other matters - on 31st January we received the call form Ofsted telling us that they would be arriving to inspect our boarding provision later that morning. This inspection lasts three days, and happens approximately once a year, but always comes when we least expect it. In this case, our new Head of Boarding, Hannah Lewis, had been in place for six days, so it was a case of baptism by fire -but Hannah and her team, with the support of other key staff, rose to the challenge and the inspection went well. I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank everyone who contributed: Hannah and her team, but also other staff, parents and students. We are still awaiting the report, but I will share the outcome and publish the report on the school's website as soon as we receive it.






# Science by Scott Wassell

# Welcome to the first science newsletter of 2023!


The year 7s have been showing their creativity with their representation of the particle model. Ms Cardinale was so pleased with the work she put on her board.

The year 11 entry level cohort have been working on the transport system in the human body, so they had a chance to dissect a heart. Enire was the consummate surgeon, showing precision and delicacy.

The year 8s have had a couple of topics covered this term. Starting off with plant reproduction. We did a lily dissection to reveal the reproductive system of a flowering plant. They have just began looking at combustion which start with lighting icing sugar, messy but fun!









# Design & Technology by Marea Saunders


In Y7, 8 and 9 students having worked on textiles projects this half term have been learning how to hand stitch, use a sewing machine and a key skill for life ironing. The Y7s have built their own Spin Art Machine and used it to decorate fabric to create their own small cushion. While in Y8 students have been learning about the batik decorative technique, using it to design and create their own fabric which they will use to make a small draw string bag. The y9s are in the process of completing a cushion cover which has a design that incorporates e-textiles, a circuit which has lighting included.

In Y10 the students having be learning about mechanisms and have used this to work in small groups to develop their own litter pickers. They are also in the final stages of completing their laminated salad servers concentrating on high quality finish. They will shortly be ready for students to take home and be fully tested at home.



Y11 students have till the end of this term to complete the manufacturing and evaluating of their design proposal for their GCSE. Students are required by the exam board to select one of the published themes to base their final project on. This year the projects vary from a water feature to aid concentration while working or studying at home and chicken bird feeder to prevent boredom while caring for animals.

# News from the Gardens by Daniel Le Cornu

News from the Gardens - after a very busy winter battling snow and floods!

#### **Parkland Work**

New beech trees (Fagus sylvatica) have been planted in the parkland to begin a long-term project to replace the very mature trees on the beech tree avenue. This project will be extended to the oak tree avenues in the next year. There are many ancient trees on the Frewen College site, and it is a unique collection, including the arboretum. The Chestnut walk (behind the playing field) is one of the oldest on the site. It is a habitat for wildlife and many bat species. I recommend viewing from a distance and to avoid walking directly under these ancient trees. Well worth a look though!



As reported in the last newsletter we had started work in the parkland to clear brambles and invasive Turkey Oak (Quercus cerris), this work has now been largely completed and the parkland has been opened up! Hopefully many snowdrops (Galanthus nivalis) bluebells (Hyacinthoides non scripta) and wood anemone (Anemone nemorosa) will return to the parkland floor now the light is able to stream through.



The next step is to give the brambles one final cut back using a rough-cut mower (Atilla). During the summer months the grass will be allowed to grow and any wildflowers establish, in the long term the parkland should become a mix of trees ancient and new and a wildflower meadow. Paths will be cut through the meadow to allow safe passage through the trees and meadow.

The bushcraft students are progressing fantastically with the building of an iron age roundhouse, from just a few of the uprights to start the structure to completed walls (using wattle). The next step will be to plaster the walls with daub (a mix of straw and clay). All of the materials to construct the roundhouse have been sourced onsite (hazel, willow, laurel, straw, clay, conifer) and nothing has been brought in!

#### Bird watching hide

We have repurposed a garden shed as a bird watching hide and this will be placed in the parkland in Spring, site tbc! It will be fitted out with a bench and table, binoculars and a sightings book.

#### **Meadows for 2023**

We are still in the process of establishing more annual and perennial wildflower meadows on the site. The parkland will be the site of a huge new perennial wildflower meadow. In the last year the site has been prepared for sowing. Preparing the ground involved removing the top layer of the most fertile soil, this was carried out using a mini digger, the site was then sprayed off to control the most invasive weeds (nettles, bindweed and horsetail), the soil is now clear and ready for seed sowing at the end of April. Once established the meadow will be a rich habitat of at least 30 different plant species and will be a haven for insects and mammals. So many of our meadows have been lost over the last 70 years and it is very difficult to re-establish these delicate ecosystems, hopefully ours will be a success!

The little wildlife pond has been cleared and restored. The water was filled with rubbish, weeds and leaves and after a few days of cutting back and dragging out the mess the water is now clearer. We spotted frogs and toads and hopefully frog spawn will be seen very soon. The fence has been repaired to make the area safe.

The next step in this project will be to build a dipping platform to access the water for science and conservation projects.



Hopefully all these projects can be used in conservation and science education.
